A Report on the General Meeting of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology in Kanazawa

Abstract

On May 20, 21, and 22,1969, the 66th General Meeting of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology was held in the former Kanazawa City Hall for Sightseeing, presided by President Yasuo Shimazono and Vice-President Ryosaku Otsuka. Although a lecture by the president, two symposiums, and 188 general lectures were scheduled at this general meeting in Kanazawa, there were no academic presentations, and only a public councilor meeting and a general conference were held. On the morning of May 19, the day before the general meeting, a board meeting was held. Following this, a council meeting was held in the Hall for Small and Mediumsized Companies around 13:00, which eventually became a public council meeting in response to a suggestion made by a few council members. In this council meeting, the board chairperson presented a general report and the 1968 business report and settlement of balance were approved, followed by presentations of reports by the committees and Q&A sessions/discussions. As the deadline for the use of the hall, 9:00 p. m., approached, a proposal for the cancellation of symposiums, general presentations, and a lecture by the president scheduled for the following day was submitted and approved. Therefore, on May 20, the public council meeting continued in which a no-confidence motion against the executive board was submitted and passed followed by the selection of new executive board members. When the council meeting

resumed, a proposal of discontinuing it and moving on to the agenda of the general meeting was submitted and approved. On May 21, during the reporting of business operation and settlement of balance in 1968 as general meeting proceedings, a question about the expenses of general meetings was raised, and the following proposal was submitted by Mr. Ozawa and adopted: "The 66th General Meeting of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology was held with the support of the capitals of pharmaceutical companies and donations from associated hospitals and at the sacrifice of the Department of Neuropsychiatry, Faculty of Medicine, Kanazawa University. These conventions have been distorting the objectives of psychiatric care and medicine, and we must reflect on this. Therefore, we have passed a resolution that the General Meetings of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology shall be administered with the financial support of its members", which has since been one of the guidelines for the administration of the society. Following this, activity plans and an income and expenditure budget draft were approved. On May 22, the Kure Award and Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology Award Selection Committees announced the names of the recipients. However, since the recipients of the award of the society expressed their intentions to withhold or refuse to receive the award, it was not awarded to them. Following this event, the number of attendees decreased below the minimum number required to hold a general meeting, and the president declared the termination of the 66th general meeting. Discussions and opinions expressed in the 66th general meeting became a foundation of the "basic principles of the academic society", which has been published at the end of every issue of the Psychiatry and Neurology Journal.

Introduction

At the 66th Annual Meeting of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology (Kanazawa Annual Meeting in Kanazawa, 1969), the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology suspended all presentations and engaged in four days of earnest discussions, including the Board of Trustees meeting, about the conventional state of the society. Since then, the society has been reforming

itself under the basic theme of reflection on Japanese psychiatry and medicine and the way forward. The year 2019 marked the 50th anniversary of the Kanazawa Annual Meeting, and to commemorate this anniversary, symposium, entitled: "50 years after the Annual Kanazawa Meeting: The subsequent reform of the society and its future prospects", was held at the 115th Annual Meeting. In this entitled: "On the Day of the Kanazawa General Meeting," we would like to describe the earnest discussions that took place during the four days from May 19 to 22, 1969.

The late German President Weizsaecker famously said: "Anyone who closes his eyes to the past is blind to the present," and so we would like to look back 50 years into the past and open our eyes to the future.

I. Preparations for the Kanazawa Annual Meeting

In October 1967, Professor Yasuo Shimazono, the President of the 66th Annual Meeting of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology, moved to Tokyo to take a professorship at Tokyo Medical and Dental University, and Professor Ryosaku Otsuka of Kanazawa University became the Vice President. The Department of Neuropsychiatry, Kanazawa University School of Medicine prepared for the 66th Annual

Meeting of the Japanese Psychiatric Society.

Abstracts of the 66th Annual Meeting of Japanese Neuropsychiatric Society were published in the Journal of Psychiatry, Vol. 71, No. 3,1 including the Presidential Address, two symposia, and 188 abstracts of general presentations, divided into 24 sections. The Department of Neuropsychiatry, Kanazawa University School Medicine prepared a bag containing the program book with a Kutani porcelain plate on the cover, the program of the Board of Councilors Meeting, and a guide to accommodation and sightseeing at the 66th Japan Neuropsychiatric Society. The last one led to criticism by a member at the general meeting, as people should come for the academic conference, not for sightseeing. The following is a list of the discussions, divided by the date of the meeting.

II. May 19: Board of Directors Meeting and Board of Councilors Meeting

The fourth meeting of the Board of Directors in FY 1968 was held at the Kanazawa Chamber of Commerce and Industry from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. on May 19, 1968. After the report on the financial statements for the fiscal year 1968, some members requested to sit in on the board meeting. The board stated that: "it is undesirable to open the

meeting to only a few people without negotiation," and prior told members who requested to observe the meeting, but more than a dozen members overcame the staff members' resistance and entered the board room. However, the proceedings of the Board of Directors meeting proceeded without any problems. Later, President Hiroshi Utena reported: "This request for an audience was based on a decision made at a meeting of members from 10 universities, and they expressed their opposition to the board's viewpoint."

On the same day, the Board of Councilors meeting was held in the main hall of the Kanazawa Chamber of Commerce and Industry Small and Medium Enterprise Hall a little after 1:00 p.m. (Figure 1). Soon after the opening of the meeting, one of the councilors proposed that the meeting be open to the public, and the proposal was approved by a show of hands. The chairpersons were then organized, and in addition to the chairman, councilors Satoru Tsuji and Yoichi Eguma were elected as chairpersons. A proposal was then passed to "allow the observers to specific issues deemed necessary by the chairpersons. The meeting then proceeded according to the printed schedule: "Program of the Board of Trustees," and the general report of the president, the business report for 1968, the settlement of accounts, and the report of the auditors were approved. The chairpersons then summarized the meeting, but there were some objections to the summary, and the summary was tabled.

As the last possible time to use the venue (9:00 p.m.) was approaching, Councilor Kenichi Harada's proposal to cancel the symposium, general lectures, and presidential address scheduled for the next day and continue the open meeting of the Board of Councilors at the Kanazawa Kanko Kaikan was approved.

III. May 20: Board of Trustees Meeting and General Assembly Agenda

The Board of Trustees meeting was held at 9:24 a.m. in the main hall of Kanazawa Kanko Kaikan, continuing the meeting held the previous day. In front of the hall, there was a cloth (Fig. 2) and signboard (Fig. 3) criticizing the society. On the other hand, inside the hall (Figure 4), there was no room to stand, and more than 1,500 members attended the meeting and participated enthusiastically in the discussions.

A motion of no confidence in the Board of Directors was submitted over the certification system, and after a vote of no confidence, the Board of Directors was rejected and new members were elected. The new board of trustees met straight away and said: "The meeting of the board of trustees is hereby

adjourned, and an ordinary general meeting will be held immediately." The proposal was passed by a show of hands. The chairman's proposal to open the General Assembly at 9:00 a.m. on the following day was subsequently approved by a show of hands.

IV. May 21 General Meeting

A motion was made to elect the chairpersons, and they were Yasuo Shimazono (President), Ryosaku Otsuka (Vice-President), and Masanao Kurihara (Member).

First, Mr. Jun Sugamata, counselor, talked about the business report and settlement of accounts for 1968 on behalf of the former president. On the expenditure side, the issue of the 250,000 yen fee for the General Assembly was raised and whether the General Assembly could be held for 250,000 yen, and Vice President Otsuka explained the activities of the Preparatory Committee for the Kanazawa General Assembly. After various discussions. Isao Ozawa proposed the following regarding the operation of the Annual Meeting: "The 66th Annual Meeting of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology has been conducted at the expense of pharmaceutical capital, donations from affiliated hospitals, and the members of the Department of Neuropsychiatry, Kanazawa University School of

Medicine. We regret that such conventional practices have distorted the state of psychiatry, and we resolve that from now on the society shall be managed at the expense of its members." The resolution was passed by a show of hands with a majority of votes in favor.

Next, the business report and settlement of accounts for the fiscal year 1968 and the settlement of accounts for the Folia Publication Society were approved, and a matter concerning the relocation of the society's offices and accompanying revision of the Articles of Incorporation were also approved.

The proposal to recommend dissolution of the Board of Trustees was then approved by a show of hands. Next, regarding the duties of the new Board of Directors, a proposal by Mr. Shigeo Shima: "Approves the new Board of Trustees under the following conditions: (1) The new Board of Trustees shall summarize the questions raised at the 66th General Assembly and organize a serious discussion of all members as soon as possible. (2) Based on the General Assembly's recommendation to dissolve the Board of Trustees, the new Board of Trustees will prepare for the election of a new Board of Trustees as soon as possible," was approved by a majority of raised hands in favor of the proposal. The two auditors were also approved, and the new offices of the

society were hereby officially decided.

The proposed business plan and income and expenditure budget for 1969 prepared by the previous Board of Directors were approved with the condition that the new Board of Directors would make some changes. The chairman's proposal to continue the General Assembly on the following day was then approved by a show of hands.

V. May 22 General Meeting

At 10:10 a.m., as the number of members had not yet reached that required for the General Assembly, Director Masahisa Nishizono reported on the meeting of the new Board of Directors held on the previous night. At 10:40 a.m., there were 456 members which was the present, quorum required for the General Assembly, and the meeting was called to order. First, there was the report of the Kure Shuzo Committee Award Selection and presentation of the Kure Shuzo Award to Dr. Junji Kaneko. The awarding ceremony was omitted due to the absence of Dr. Kaneko. Next, the meeting moved on to the report of the Academic Society Award Selection Committee and presentation of the awards. It was reported that the Academic Society Award would be given to Akio Asaka and Kimio Moriyama. However, since Mr. Asaka commented that he would like to withhold the award until the normalization of the society, and Mr. Moriyama said that he would like to decline the award, the awards were not given.

After that, during the discussion on the "against the University resolution Security Legislation," the number of participants was less than that required for the General Assembly, and even after the lunch break, the quorum for the General Assembly was not reached, so President Yasuo Shimazono called the meeting to a close. Director Yoichi Eguma also thanked the president, vice presidents, and Kanazawa class members, and the General Meeting was adjourned at 1:50 p.m. After that, the of the Department members Neuropsychiatry, Kanazawa University School of Medicine began to clean up the venue. Even now, 50 years later, I clearly remember that Vice President Otsuka was crying in a corner of the hall.

Conclusion

At the 66th Annual Meeting of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology (Kanazawa, 1969), the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology cancelled all presentations and held four days of earnest discussions, including a meeting of the Board of Trustees, on the conventional state of the society. This was known as the Kanazawa General Meeting. An outline of the meeting is given in: "The

66th Annual Meeting of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology," by Yasuo Shimazono⁴⁾, President of the Society, and "Report of the 66th Annual Meeting of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology," by the Board of Directors of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology³⁾, while the detailed version is based on the notes written by Narivoshi Yamaguchi, with some omissions, and edited by three directors: Yasuo Okada, Toshio Hara, and Ken-ichi Harada. The detailed version is the: "Minutes of the 66th Annual Meeting of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology,"2) edited by Yasuo Okada, Toshio Hara, and Ken-ichi Harada.

Since then, the society has been reforming itself under the basic theme of reflection on Japanese psychiatry and medicine and the path it should take in the future. The results of these efforts are summarized in the: "Basic Philosophy of the Society," which has appeared at the end of every issue of the Journal of Psychiatry and Neurology since 2005 (Vol. 107, No. 1).

Editor's note: This special issue is based on the content of the symposium at the 115th Annual Meeting of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology in 2019, which will mark the 50th anniversary of the Kanazawa Annual Meeting.

After the Kanazawa Annual Meeting, the Department of Neuropsychiatry, University School Kanazawa Medicine held a meeting every Tuesday afternoon, and young doctors in the submitted department various problems to the meeting, but such an atmosphere of the meeting only lasted for about six months, and we returned to the traditional meeting where new papers were abstracted and case reports were made. Professor Ryosaku Otsuka passed away from stomach cancer on October 16, 1974. He was 48 years old, and we were sorry to hear of his death; whether it was because he was tired from the conference or because he did not pay much attention to his health.

Table. Basic Philosophy of the Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology

The Japanese Society of Psychiatry and Neurology was founded in 1902 with the purpose of: "promoting research in psychiatry and neurology and promoting liaison and cooperation among members, thereby contributing to the development of science and culture" (Article 3 of the Articles of Incorporation). We have been tackling not only academic research but also a wide range of practical issues related to clinical psychiatric neurology. In particular, since the 66th General Meeting (Kanazawa,

1969), the society has been sincerely reflecting on Japanese psychiatry and medicine and the way forward as its basic theme, and each member is required to always adhere to the following basic principles of the society:

- 1. Members must always contribute to the development of psychiatry and neurology in an ethical manner.
- 2. Members shall respect the human rights of patients and contribute to the qualitative improvement of mental health, medical care, and welfare by comprehensively considering mental, physical, social, and ethical aspects.
- 3. Members must manage the society democratically and fulfill the function of mutual study and inspection among members.
